


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
Background

Barriers









What We Did/Development



Design Training

Existing slide deck as start point.

Adapted each session to each audience.

Developed slide deck using new materials available – Hearts & Minds.



Healthcare professions

Broke down to find key professions within healthcare.

Received input from community.



Utilised Networks

Using our academics within the Fast Track Cities Bristol network we asked them to find cohort leads and initiated introductions.



Steward Relationships

Request a video call.

Have data ready.

Provide examples of poor practice.

Relay the benefits that these students are in a learning mode and can spread learnings to teams.



Funding!

Charge for the training.

Be flexible.

Each cohort lead agreed budget to deliver.








Any training delivered must include a positive speaker.

Learnings



Adapt each session to each audience including relevant papers, data, case studies and experience from positive speaker.



Discuss with cohort leads any content which has been delivered already, what learning outcomes need to be met for that module and if needed writing of case scenarios.



HIV Awareness training is needed and when delivered, hugely valued by students and lecturers who are also practising. University route of delivery has proven the most open and highly successful over direct with trust.





Maintain relationships with cohort leads.

Next Steps



Ensure continuation of training remains on cohort syllabus for future years.



Expand training to other cohorts e.g. Midwives, OT's, Social Work undergrads.
